THE PASTOR'S NOTE...

The strangest thing just happened. My kids got home from Trick or Treating and they dumped their buckets on the kitchen floor and began to systematically and politely (*politely!*) trade the pieces of their own candy that they dislike for the pieces of candy they prefer from their siblings.

What made this strange, was not the transaction (they make deals all the time). What shocked me was how they ended each deal. They ended cheerfully - with a smile, sometimes a handshake, and always a "thank you" uttered from both individuals involved.

I had to hide so I could witness all of this. I put my nose in my phone in the next room over, pretending to be preoccupied, and listened. Three specific things stand out in my mind.

- 1. Knowing the girls have nut allergies, they all immediately put all of the peanut/tree nut candy into a pile to be taken out of the house.
- 2. When Molly traded John skittles for a tootsie roll, he adjusted his trading strategy to find a way to get her all of the other tootsie rolls in his candy bag (because he knew she like them).
- 3. By the end, they were just giving candy away. Without expectation. Without a trade. Without a return in exchange.

My kids are far from perfect. (In fact, I think they only said "thank you" to each other because Kate and I told them all day long: anytime you get a treat you say thank you. you get that, right? every. every. time. even if it's good&plenty. say thank you. even if it's candy corn. say thank you. even if it's black licorice. say thank you. even if its Necco Wafers... you have to find a way to say thank you.)

The prophet Isaiah says, "A little child shall lead them," and every now and then my kids remind me of that. Here's what I learned this Halloween...

- 1. Let us put aside that which hurts anyone. (I'm no longer talking about candy. I'm talking about the big picture stuff. If it "tastes great" but hurts your neighbor, let it go.)
- 2. If we have what others need, let us share.
- 3. Let us give without expectation.

We are now entering a stewardship month. This is true not just for the church but for the wider world. This is a season of Thanks Giving... of Giving Thanks. Like kids taking an inventory of their Halloween candy stash, we are invited to take an inventory of what we have (which includes not just our treasure, but also our time and talents). We are called not just to give thanks, but also to respond.

And so, let us put aside anything that might hurt others. Let us share what we have with those in need. Moreover, if it is possible, let us give without expectation. Let us give as freely as our God has given to us. con't page 2.

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me.

Matthew 25:35

God richly provides for daily bread — the earth can produce enough food for everyone. Yet, many of our sisters and brothers still go hungry. 820 million, or 11%, in the world go hungry; in the US there are 40 million hungry.

By providing immediate relief to those who are hungry, we meet basic needs and recognize the universal human right to food. But ending hunger is about more than food. By connecting people with the resources they need to produce food and gain access to clean water, education, health care and sources of income, long-term, sustainable change can be accomplished.

We start with relationships marked by conversation and listening.

We believe people know their own communities best. It is our congregations and our global companion churches that first identify the local needs and related solutions to help make a difference.

Then, we partner with communities to help make those solutions a reality.

COUNCIL UPDATE - OCTOBER

The October Council Meeting was held on the 18th at 7:00PM. The meeting began with devotions, scripture and prayer centered on Psalm 86. The agenda was approved and the minutes were amended slightly and approved as well.

Pastor Scott reported two weddings, a busy month, and the resumption of some youth activities. Pastor noted a busy month. The OMC is progressing and a capital appeal will take place in December. Pastor noted some staffing updates and encouraged the council to be hospitable, welcoming, and friendly on Sunday morning as we continue to have guests each week at most services.

The committees offered the following reports...

Social Ministry: We will collect money for World Hunger on 10/16, socks for Friends of Night People on 10/23, & bags of cheer on 10/30.

Worship & Music: The offertory plate is being passed by ushers or worship assistants at each service. A meeting will be held in the near future to discuss the upcoming holiday season.

Personnel: Klaus Schonrank has been hired as sexton. He is off to a great start. Sara, our office administrative assistant, was terminated from her position. Volunteers are staffing the office while we navigate this transitional chapter.

Christian Education: John Reich has written a Christmas Play that will be put on by the SS youth on December 18th. Classes continue on Sunday morning from 9:30-10AM.

Youth: The first Youth Night took place. A monthly Youth Night will happen throughout the school year.

Building and Grounds: Many, many thanks to Norm H. for his ongoing work on the church grounds and with the heating system. Thanks to the volunteers who installed the floor in the conference room hallway.

Finance: We have acquired Builder's Risk Insurance as we anticipate construction in the near future.

Stewardship: A campaign will happen in November including a letter, pledge drive, and Temple Talks during worship.

Financial Secretary: Ginny H. reported on our income and expenses through the year. Overall, last month (and so far this month) was good. Currently, our income exceeds our expenses (though not by much).

In the business portion of the meeting, Pastor announced that we should break ground on the OMC in the next couple of weeks. New Council members will be elected at a congregational meeting on December 11th at 9:30AM. Committees are encouraged to get budget figures to the finance committee in November. Christmas and Advent planning will be discussed by the W&M committee. All members and groups are encouraged to clean up after themselves and leave the church (especially the kitchens & sinks) free from soiled dishes and debris. Finally, a budget of 7-10K has been allotted from memorial funds to furnish the Gathering Space. Pastor will purchase furniture in conversation with the groups that utilize that space the most.

The meeting adjourned and concluded with the Lord's Prayer and additional prayers from Rev. Irmer.
