Dear Friends,

As we begin another Lenten journey, I commend to you the following spiritual disciplines...

PRAY.

Our prayers may be offered in many different forms. Sometimes they're out loud. At other times they're in the silence of our hearts. At times they're articulate and well composed. And sometimes it's just a groan. If you're not in the practice of daily prayer, why not use the next 40 days as an opportunity to be intentional about talking with God?

FAST.

Historically, the season of Lent has provided disciples a chance to deny themselves. Maybe you've heard of or have tried "giving something up." While I hardly think skipping wings and having fish fries is a sacrifice or great spiritual endeavor, I do think it is worth asking: what practices do we have in place to say NO to ourselves?

In Isaiah God says, "The fast I choose is a fast from injustice, a break from oppression, an end to finger-pointing, and the cessation of evil. Instead, feed the hungry, care for those who have needs, help the homeless." (my translation, Isaiah 58:1-12) If we can't think of a way to say NO to ourselves, can we ponder "taking something on" this Lent that would pull us outward?

WORSHIP.

The scriptures call us to return to the Lord our God. One of the ways we do that is through public, corporate worship. We gather with our brothers and sisters in Christ around the font and the table. We gather to hear God's word and share Christ's peace. We gather to be centered, grounded, and ultimately sent.

In Lent we provide special services to guide us through this season of growth. Ash Wednesday, mid-week services, and Holy Week (Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday) each offer additional opportunities for spiritual renewal.

Sometimes I'll be talking with a Christian and they'll confess, "Pastor, I really don't feel very close to God." Or, "I wish I were more religious (or spiritual)."
I'll then ask, Okay, are you praying? NO. Are you connected to a church? NO. Do you worship regularly? NO. Do you have friendships where you're comfortable talking about God? NO. Do you read the Bible? NO. (I'll keep going until it hits.)

Our God does not need nor want us to be disciples in name only. Rather, we are called to be disciplined. This Lent our congregational challenge is to increase our prayer, denial of self, and worship. May we come to know the joy that comes from following Christ.

COUNCIL UPDATE - JANUARY

The January church council meeting was held on January 16th, 2024.

The meeting began with prayer and the election of officers. The executive officers for 2024 are: President Lee Dryden, Vice President CJ Ullrich, Secretary Lisa Leach, and Treasurer Ellen Pancoe. Ginny Hohl will continue to serve as financial secretary. Many thanks were offered to our council members and leaders.

In his report Pastor Scott noted that Christmas was very joyful and well attended. Pastor thanked the many volunteers and musicians who went above and beyond to enhance the worship experience for many. There was one funeral in early January for Raymond Chipman.

The committees offered the following reports...

Social Ministry – The donations to Sleep in Heavenly Peace will be delivered with an additional financial donation from the congregation.

Christian Education – The spring semester has begun. We hope to modernize the lessons and sign-up process for Sunday School utilizing digital resources. The weekly adult bible study continues on Wednesdays at 7PM via zoom.

Fellowship – Fellowship activities are in the works. Anyone who wants to get involved is encouraged to contact Lisa Leach.

Worship & Music – We will put all advent and Christmas decorations away on Saturday, January 21.

Personnel – A possible candidate for Youth Director has been identified. Building and Grounds – There were several repairs including faucets, roof, gutters, and pumps.

Stewardship – 48 pledges were received totally \$148,000 for 2024.

Finance – 2023 ended well financially. Weekly giving, loose plate giving, and building use all exceeded expectations. Through that generosity we were able to cover Pastor's sabbatical in 2024 and carry a surplus of \$25,000 into the new year. A mortgage fund has been created and individuals are encourage to give what they can when they can.

ELCA World Hunger Spring Appeal

LOAVES AND FISHES

In keeping with this year's celebration of the 50th anniversary of ELCA World Hunger, our Upstate New York Synod's Hunger Justice Team - inspired by Jesus' miraculous feeding of the 5000 with only five loaves of bread and two small fish - will encourage congregations to live out God's generosity by empowering those living with food insecurity - which is interconnected with poverty and health - for the hope of a better livelihood. To this end, we are encouraging congregations to direct their giving specifically to two areas which resonate with God's abundance: FISH FARMING AND IRRIGATION.


An old proverb says "Give your neighbors and fish, and they'll eat for a day". Give your neighbors a community fish farm, and they'll eat for lifetime. A fish farm starts with a pond, training and a few fast-growing fish, such as tilapia (St. Peter's fish). Soon the pond provides food rich in vitamins, minerals and protein. Irrigation systems are critical, especially for those farmers around the world who rely on rainwater to nourish their crops. When the rain doesn't fall, an entire community can be vulnerable to drought and hunger.

Your generosity funds programs around the world that address the complex and connected root causes of hunger in more than 60 countries, including ours, as we accompany companions hard at work providing food, health care, agricultural training safe water, livelihood support and more. Our challenge at St. John is to give of our resources to provide for two fish farms (a) \$250 each; and, if the Spirit is particularly active, to also provide increments of \$100 to fund a portion of an irrigation project.

1 know 1 can count on your generosity. With gratitude and hope, let us give, that all the world may be fed.
