THE PASTOR'S NOTE ...

I was in a bad mood. I'll admit it.

I had a headache. I was tired. I felt drained emotionally and physically and spiritually. It was snowing. It was cold. Matthew was home with a fever. Our household was stressed beyond belief.

And... in the midst of it all, I had to run Molly to swimming at the High School and John to wrestling at the Middle School.

Like I said, I'll admit it... I was in a bad mood.

While sitting in the parking lot waiting for one kid so I could go get the other, I thought to myself: *Isn't this great?! Isn't this fun?! Isn't this an absolute honor and joy?!* I was being sarcastic, of course. I was miserable. Internally, I threw a pity party that would make Times Square on New Year's Eve seem benign. (Please don't read more into this than there really is. I love that my kids are into things. It's just sometimes when you feel lousy and the weather stinks and it's dark at 5PM you want to be home on a couch with cocoa.)

Child #1 was late (*naturally*) and so the universe gave me ample time to complain. My ongoing problem was that with each lament I felt worse and not better than before. Complaining didn't take my headache away. It didn't take the snow away. It didn't take Matthew's fever away. And it didn't take my responsibilities away. It just left me feeling even sorrier for myself than before.

That is when I started to say things differently – <u>out loud</u> this time. First, I said, *Isn't this great?!* sarcastically. And then I said it like I meant it. *Isn't. This. Great?!* Then I said it like I was a 5-year-old at Disney World... *ISN'T THIS GREAT?!*. And then I said it like I did on my honeymoon at dinner sitting across the table from my wife... *isn't this great?!*. After that I kept repeating it a bunch of different ways.

Then, the strangest thing happened. For a moment, I entertained the possibility that this entire experience was actually 'great'. I know it sounds cheesy (*like is your cup half full or half empty*) but it worked. (*Which is why I'm writing about it now*.) It was great. It's wasn't easy or fun. But it was great in the sort of ways you don't expect.

In the New Testament, the concept of repentance is less about saying sorry and more about changing your perspective. It is not about lamenting the past. It is all about orienting yourself for the present and the future. In fact, the Greek word for repentance actually just means: to change your mind's eye. Sometimes that means looking in a **different** direction, but sometimes that means looking at things **differently**. As we begin another church year in this holy season of Advent, that is ultimately what we are called to do. We are called to sit here in the darkness, in the cold, in the snow, with our headaches, and hurts and fears and troubles, and change our perspective. We are called to see blessings in the midst of ailments, to see gifts in the midst of burdens, and we are called to see responsibility as a holy and awesome opportunity. St. Paul says: Give thanks in all circumstances. Which on this night meant for me shout, *isn't this great?!*, even when I was in a bad mood.

My guess is at some point over these next few weeks you're going to be in a bad mood... Waiting in line. Frantically seeking the perfect gift. Panicking over weather. Worried about a loved one. Running errands that aren't nearly as important as they seem. Carrying out mundane tasks when all you want to do is call it quits. Stressing over finances. Irritated at the universe. In disbelief at the lack of common sense in the world.

In those moments may you shout: **isn't this great?!** Try it a few different ways. And keep going until you laugh or cry. Don't quit until you reach that moment where you entertain the possibility that it is. <u>Because it is</u>. Our savior assured us of that when he made death the gate to eternal life. Give thanks in all circumstances.

Life is never so good it's not bad and never so bad it's not good. So, let's repent and change our perspective on those dark days and seek out the light.

COUNCIL UPDATE - NOVEMBER

The November council meeting was held on the 15th and was called to order at 7:04PM. The meeting began with devotions after which the agenda and previous month's minutes were approved.

Pastor reported on pastoral acts including a baptism, confirmations, and a funeral. Pastor thanked the volunteers that have been assisting in the office and those who continue to help out around the church during the week.

The committees offered the following reports:

Social Ministry: The executive director of Family Promise will address St. John this month. Our Advent Project will support their shelter for homeless families.

Fellowship: The ladies' lunch bunch continues to meet. Men's breakfast is the first Monday of the month. Men's ministry meets on Saturdays at 9AM.

Personnel: We are preparing to post the Administrative Assistant position. Klaus Schonrank is working out very well as sexton.

Christian Education: Attendance is stable. Pageant practice begins on 11.27. Pageant on 12.18. Winter/Spring Sunday School resumes 1.8.2023.

Building and Grounds: Walls have been repaired and the lawnmower has been serviced. We continue to experience trouble with the boilers. A fix approximating \$3,000 is anticipated.

Mutual Ministry: The committee met with Pastor and discussed current and anticipated ministry considerations. The committee excused Pastor Hannon and discussed a salary increase. New figures will be finalized & presented to the congregation at the annual meeting on December 11th.

Stewardship: A stewardship letter was mailed out. Pledges are encouraged from all contributing members. **Finance**: We are building a budget for 2023. We are currently in the black. Our building rental income is helping. We raised over \$1,800 for ELCA World Hunger.

During the business portion of the meeting we discussed our outgoing benevolence. The council decided to support GiGi's Playhouse, Danceability, Inc., Heritage Christian Services, the Kloppenberg Family, LCLC, and the Way Program at OLV.

Looking ahead, President Cote and Pastor Irmer's council terms end this year. Lee Dryden will serve another term. Two council seats will be filled at the December annual meeting.
