## The Eagle

For the past several months, our council, leadership, volunteers, and general assembly have had the opportunity to participate in and assess a blended, unified, single worship service at 9:30AM. Overall, the response has been positive. Our worship attendance has not declined (in fact, it appears to have increased over 2024 averages). Participation, including youth leadership, has increased. The time change has not appeared to disrupt our individual patterned lives too dramatically.

For these reasons and others, the council has decided to continue the practice of worshiping at 9:30AM with a blended service. If you have comments (positive or negative) regarding worship at St. John you may email the office, me, or Candy Scorsone our worship & music chairperson. Contact information can be found in the church directory (which may be picked up on Sunday morning).

The most significant, and seemingly only, challenge to this blended service appears to be how to balance traditional and contemporary music. As a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America we are accustomed to a traditional form of worship. That is true of ALL of the worship at St. John. Our form follows the ancient church's practice of Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending. As an ELCA congregation we are also in the practice of keeping things contemporary (it is what it means to be Lutheran – always reforming, becoming, and relevant).


Since going to one service, we have primarily used settings from the ELW and WOV. Currently, we are borrowing a setting from our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters called the *Mass of Restoration*. The settings are always changing (every 6-10 weeks). There will be some you find familiar and some that are new. There will be some you prefer and some you do not.

To that end, I cannot guarantee that you'll prefer every song you hear when you worship at St. John on Sunday morning. Each week we will play hymns on the organ and hymns with guitar & piano. Music is subjective. As we move forward with a unified, blended, singular service, you should anticipate that you'll likely hear a hymn played too traditional or too contemporary for your taste. It's okay to not prefer every song you hear. We're trying to build a worship experience for all ages, demographics, generations, and peoples. To keep things balanced, we divide the four primary hymns each week between two from the ELW and two from our contemporary list.

### St. John Lutheran Church Church Council Meeting ~ March 18, 2025

The March church council meeting was held on the 18<sup>th</sup> at 7PM via Zoom. Pastor Scott, Lee Dryden, CJ Ullrich, Ellen Pancoe, Klansee Bulmer, Paul Swanson, Candy Scorsone, Ken Figel, Shirleen Besch, and Ginny Hohl were in attendance. After the previous month's meetings were adjusted and approved, Pastor led Evening Prayer from the ELW and the council meditated on the 27<sup>th</sup> Psalm.

Pastor Scott reported on worship, Lent, Ash Wednesday, and the Wednesday Evening Program. A vision/strategic planning/fundraising committee has been formed and is working to name our assets and needs. Pastor continues to serve as chaplain at Main Transit. The executive director of LCLC is visiting St. John on May 4<sup>th</sup>. There was one funeral for Carole Reid.

The committees offered the following reports:

Community Outreach – Our Lenten outreach is to support the Refugee Partnership of WNY. There are 731 families in WNY in need because of cuts in federal funding. The Arc & Hospice are going to provide presentations this Lent.

Christian Education – a Youth Sunday will be held this spring/early summer.

Fellowship – a signup is on the bulletin board in the Gathering Space inviting folks to bring snacks/refreshments for coffee hour after worship on Sunday mornings.

Worship & Music – we continue to receive positive feedback from the transition to one service.

Personnel – Alex Dominique's contract with St. John ends at the end of May. He will work as a counselor at LCLC for the summer. We hope to hire Alex again in the fall.

Youth – A summer day camp will be held at St. John the first two and last two weeks of the summer. It will be capped at 25 kids per week. This is a ministry of Lutheran Youth WNY. Camperships are available for kids to go to LCLC.

Buildings & Grounds – A meeting was held in March. We are seeking bids to update/upgrade the lights in the sanctuary.

Financial Secretary – Our audit will be held on March 29<sup>th</sup>. Our finances are stable. We discussed the benefits of RMD donations to the church.

The meeting ended with encouragement to get involved and stay active. We concluded with the Lord's Prayer.


