A NOTE FROM PASTOR SCOTT

Dear Friends.

I confess that I was not ready to pastor a church through a pandemic.

In seminary, we tried to prepare ourselves to be ready for anything and everything. In the classroom by day and around bonfires at night we shared holy conversations about what ministry might look like in the most extreme circumstances. We talked about hypothetical tragedies, nonsensical violence, wars, shootings, natural disasters, political upheaval... you name it. But for all our discussions we never thought to talk about how to be the church through a plague.

I suspect that's probably true for every other area of life too.

I doubt many business owners opened shop with a "break glass in case of global pandemic" plan. We know many restaurants found themselves flatfooted and trapped. Educational institutions from preschools through grad schools had to "build the planes as they flew them." I doubt nursing home staff members were prepared to turn spouses and children away from their loved ones for months on end. I doubt ICU nurses were prepared to be surrogate loved ones for those who did not wish to die alone. We know that everyone who lost someone in the last year, whether it was Covid or something else, was not ready to say goodbye.

And, I think that's part of what made this last year and a half so difficult...

we weren't ready.

Truth be told, I'm not all that sure we're really ready for much of anything we pretend to be so prepared for. I mean, seriously, is really possible to prepare for tragedy, calamity, or disaster? We might know the rug is about to be pulled from under us, but is that information enough to keep us from falling? Will that make the fall hurts less? My guess is... probably not.

In scripture, Jesus frequently tells his disciples to, "Be ready." He does so both in parables and outright. In fact, themes of readiness and preparedness saturate the scriptures.

"Keep awake; watch at all times."

1 Peter 5:8

In general, scripture teaches us to be ready. We should note, however, that the readiness we are called to is not one that prevents us from being harmed or hurt. In scripture being ready does not shield one from life's storms or global pandemics. Moreover, being ready does not promise protection from tragedies or pain. Rather, the readiness we are called to is a readiness to receive Jesus and a readiness to respond.

No one was ready for the pandemic, not me and dare I say, not our church either, but were ready to respond. The next question is, are we ready to respond to what is next? (Trust me, it might not be a pandemic but there will be something next.) Will we be light for those who dwell in darkness? Will we hoard for ourselves or feed the hungry? Will we speak out against tyranny and injustice or retreat? Will we serve and sacrifice or live selfishly and lavishly? Are we ready to respond with forgiveness when necessary? With compassion when it is called for? With mercy for those in need?

Speaking of readiness, I lament and marvel at what is happening in Miami, FL. I lament the collapse of that condo and the possibility that it might have been avoided. I think it is safe to say NO ONE was ready for that. NO ONE. But I marvel at how quick some people were ready to respond. I marvel at their readiness to respond with fortitude, courage, sacrifice, and resilience. That readiness to respond is ultimately what we as Christians are called to do as a part of our everyday life.

Keep awake, Jesus says. Keep Watch, he reiterates. Be ready to respond.

May we be ready to respond with prayers, ready to respond with praise, and, like our ancestors through the centuries, may we be ready to respond with enduring faithfulness and courage.

The June meeting of the church council was held on June 22nd at 7:00PM via Zoom. After the agenda and minutes were approved, Pastor led devotions and prayed focusing on the 23rd psalm. Pastor Scott then reported on the month's baptisms and memorial service. He noted that worship will continue to be held in a hybrid format (inside/outside, in-person/online). First Communion will be scheduled in the fall to accommodate busy summer schedules. And, that at home visitation will pick up this summer. Youth – We hope to hold a monthly event for our youth throughout the summer.

Building and Grounds – Many thanks to those who helped fill the dumpster with the debris from the basement as well as debris dumped over years at the northeast corner of the parking lot. It is looking good!

Mutual Ministry – A meeting is scheduled for June 23rd with Pastor.

Cemetery Committee – Plans continue for the Cremation Garden project.


Financial Report – Currently, our annual revenue exceeds expenditures by \$29,000. This may be credited to vacant staff positions and PPP loan that has covered salary. The May offering was about \$5,000 lower than budget. It was noted that giving at outdoor services is sporadic because collection is not centrally organized. The fees on internet giving so far in 2021 are about \$400.

Personnel – There was discussion of the plan to have a Contemporary Music Leader and a Traditional Music Leader with neither designated as Music Director. A motion was made and unanimously approved to hire Elena Erokhina as the Contemporary Music Leader and Cindy Lin as the Traditional Music Leader.

In the business portion of the meeting building rentals were discussed. Following a discussion from the health and safety team a motion was made and approved to allow our groups and ministry partners to use the facility. Additionally, we will rent out to friends and family for private events.

The meeting concluded with Lord's Prayer at 8:12 PM.

Retired Clergy Spotlight: Pastor Nancy Milleville



Well... I'm headed to my 50th high school reunion this month (August)! That will tell you I graduated from high school in 1971. Although I was born in Germany (an Army brat), I grew up in Grand Rapids, Michigan. I am the oldest of 4 children. My next oldest brother is 8 years younger than I, so psychologists will tell you that I was really raised as an only child. Following graduation, I left Grand Rapids for a good Lutheran college in Minnesota, Gustavus Adolphus. After 2 years and some frustration with the elementary education department, I took a year off to work for the Lutheran church as a Youth Staffer in the New England Synod. That brought me to the East Coast and Upsala College (another good Lutheran school!) in New Jersey, from which I graduated.

It was during that year off that I was introduced to the notion that I could become a pastor. Prior to that I knew that I wanted to work in the Church, but I thought the only thing available for me was Director of Christian Education and/or Youth. The Church approved the ordination of women in 1970, but I didn't know that! During my senior year in college, I discovered that I really didn't like teaching, so my career goals took an about face. Suddenly, I was applying to go to seminary in Philadelphia! Four years later I was called to serve at St. John's in Elma and ordained there in 1980.

I met my "Ever-Lovin'" the next year while attending a worship conference in Columbus, Ohio. He was a church organist in Dayton. We decided to get married in order to reduce our phone bills (that's when you paid for long distance!) and because he had a microwave, a rare thing back then!! We married in 1982 and moved into the parsonage in Elma. It was a few years later that Randy decided to test out seminary. So now he jokingly says that I'm the original Pastor Milleville and he's the new and improved version! We have never served together because I never wanted to be seen as his assistant and in a male dominated Church then (and in some ways, even now) I was afraid that's the role I'd be relegated to.

I have served 3 congregations in Western NY, St. John's, Elma; Ascension, Amherst; and Crossroads, Amherst. I did a stint as the conference dean when Pastor Scott was called to St. John! I retired in 2016 and told my husband that I was going to Arizona for the winter and he was welcome to come and visit! He didn't retire for a couple more years but was able to spend a good bit of time with me each winter. We remodeled a park model trailer in Mesa, which had been my parents' winter home for many years. I have come to love the desert and the constant sunshine. It is an active community that we live in, so we are never short on things to do or people to do them with. At this point, we still enjoy driving back and forth and seeing as much of the country as we can in the process. International travel is also frequently on our calendar!

I continue to serve as a supply preacher when in Western NY. In AZ I serve as a very part-time "seasonal" pastor at the Lutheran church just down the road from our park. Beyond that, gardening, travel, knitting, and sewing occupy much of my time.

We have 3 children:

Francien, a.k.a. "Special," is from Liberia. She came to live with us at the age of 15 in 1984. We have never adopted her, but she is as much our child as our natural-born sons are. She is now Dr. "Special", serving as a college professor and private psychologist focusing on immigration/refugee issues. She is married to Abraham and together they have given us 4 granddaughters.

Philip is our firstborn. After high school, he enlisted in the Army and served in Iraq. His transition to civilian life has been difficult. He now lives in the mountains outside of Denver. He is an excellent cook!

Matthew brought up the rear. Upon graduation, he enrolled in community college and received his Associate's degree in criminal justice. He is now living and working in Portland, Oregon.




