THE PASTOR'S NOTE ...

They saw themselves.

The

When the pagan Persian army captured the Holy Land in 614 CE, they did what captors have done for the last 4,000+ years... they demolished the holy places. Church after church was destroyed. Christian holy places were replaced with new temples for new gods. When they arrived at the Basilica of the Nativity in Bethlehem, they were ready to raze.

With torches presumably in hand, the Persian army entered the church. At this point, there was a rhythm to their devastation – enter, plunder, destroy, rebuild, rededicate, repeat. And yet something happened when they entered that church. They were thrown off beat and to this day the mosaic floor of that original church can still be seen (dating back to the 4th century). While they tore down every single church in the Holy Land, they did not tear down these walls. They did not descrate the altar. They did not burn it down. Instead, they left it standing...

because they saw themselves.

When the Persian army entered the Basilica of the Nativity (a church that commemorates the birth of Christ), they looked around and noticed the art on the walls. And so, they saw the wisemen, the magi from the east (Persia), on a mosaic and they recognized themselves in the art. They saw their own clothing, likeness, and appearance. This was all it took to spare the building. This was all it took for them to put down their torches.

Too often I fear as we look around that we do not see ourselves but rather see the "other." We notice the differences and what sets us apart. We see strangers and sometimes enemies or threats. I wonder what might change if we began to see ourselves in the people we encounter instead of someone else. I wonder if we, like the Persian army, might be moved by that realization. I wonder if it might lead to peace.

We have entered an election season where many of the powers-that-be will daily remind us of our differences. For the next year and a half, we will be pushed into corners, set on opposite sides, and convinced that the people on the other side of the room are "dangerous." There will be vilification and defamation. It will hardly feel at times like we live in the *United* States.

Beyond politics we know this same pattern repeats itself in countless other ways. In the world, at work, and even at times at church, we find ourselves sizing one another up – noticing in what ways we are different, noticing in what ways the other seems strange. Left unchecked this pattern leads to division and distrust, and eventually to witch hunts and destruction.

In scripture, St. Paul writes, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female for all are one in Jesus Christ." (Gal. 3:28) In short, what St. Paul was saying is: stop pointing out the differences, stop focusing on what sets you apart, stop dividing yourselves into groups and categories. Instead, see what you share. Remember all are one in Jesus Christ.

While these were instructions for the early Christian church, I believe they can also serve as wisdom for the entirety of humanity today. We are all children of God. We all bear the image and likeness of God. We are brothers and sisters. We are in this together. May we begin to see ourselves in each other. Let's put down the torches and share signs of peace.

COUNCIL UPDATE - APRIL

There was no council meeting in March. In April the council met on the 18th at 7:00PM. The meeting began with scripture and prayer. The agenda was accepted and the February minutes were approved.

Pastor Scott reported on 3 baptisms, 6 first communions, 1 wedding, and a memorial service. Pastor thanked the council and congregation for their leadership and participation in the Lenten activities and worship. He also thanked the church for the support of his pilgrimage to the Holy Land. It was noted that we continue to have guests and visitors. Please be sure to greet guests and go out of your way to say hello to familiar and unfamiliar faces on Sunday mornings.

The committees offered the following reports:

Social Ministry: We are seeking monetary donations to build up our "Feeding Friends" fund. These monies are used to supply the monthly meal we serve at Friends of Night People.

Fellowship: The council spent some time considering fellowship and what next steps should be done. Lisa Leach is looking for volunteers to serve on the fellowship committee. Looking ahead there will be a coffee hour when we go to one service, a new member gathering, and a congregation-wide picnic this summer. Nametags will be produced for new members.

Personnel: Personnel reviews were completed. Elena has resigned. We will be posting the contemporary music director position.

Worship & Music: volunteer singers and musicians are leading music at the 8:30AM service. Cindy will cover hymns & various anthems. A motion was presented to go to ONE service at 9:30AM on Memorial Day weekend. It was approved. We will worship at 9:30AM from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend.

Youth: Confirmation Students are encouraged to attend camp at LCLC from July 9th-14th. Financial support will be provided.

Building & Grounds: Members continue to tackle ongoing maintenance and projects. Thanks to Paul Swanson for addressing the water damage in the Haller House basement.

Cemetery: The wrought iron fence has been repaired.

Financial Report: Our expenses exceed revenue by \$6,730.88 through the first quarter of the year. Weekly giving is under budget. Lent, loose plate, and building use are stronger than projected. Our savings and special accounts have roughly \$200,000.

The meeting concluded with no additional business. The council will meet again on May 16th. We adjourned and prayed the Lord's Prayer.

ELCA World Hunger Synodical Spring Appeal "BEE GENEROUS: PLANT SEEDS OF JUSTICE"

As we anticipate earth's greening after a long and bitter winter, and renewed by the promise of Lent and Easter, we are challenged this spring by our synod Hunger Justice Team to support ELCA World Hunger ministries that are seeking to make God's creation more sustainable and support families in need through the development of community gardens and bee colonies.

A basic community garden setup, which includes seeds, soil, tools and training, combined with the development of a honeybee colony, costs approximately \$220.00. Based on these figures, every congregation in our Synod is challenged to give \$440.00 to cover two gardens and bee colonies. A garden will help a family to be self-supporting; and the honeybees are not only providing honey to eat, but to make beeswax soap and candles which allow a family to start a small business.

The gift from St. John will be taken to Synod Assembly in June, where we will reflect on the theme of "Restorative Justice", based on Amos 5:26: "Let justice roll down like water and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream".
