Dear Friends.

I confess to you that I feel fairly beaten up and broke down by the hardships and tragedies of this world we live in. While normal life was difficult enough, pandemic life was at times insurmountably hard. As we emerged from what we hoped was the worst of the pandemic, things were supposed to get easier - better - normaler (yes, I know that's not a word). And yet, when we glimpsed the light at the end of the tunnel we were reminded of the darkness that still permeates creation. War raged across the way. Smaller battles were waged in our country, county, city, and sometimes homes. And then the shootings happened. Again. And again.

In times like these we are often left feeling helpless and hopeless. Many of us question the difference we can make in the world. Others wonder why try anything at all. All of which I bring up to say: if you've felt that way - if you've felt helpless or hopeless or even just lost and angry, it does not make you a bad Christian or a bad person. It means you're human. It means you're having a perfectly predictable and normal response to insurmountable calamities. It means you're connected. It means you care. And that's a good thing.

Many times when we're tempted to give up or give in, we turn to our politicians for the answers and action. We expect *them* to make promises of revenge, retribution, and justice. We anticipate a response from *them* as violent as the crime(s) committed. We often allow ourselves to believe that if *they* just punish someone enough, we might feel better about all that's transpired.

But if history teaches us anything, that is that that is not how things work. They can't bomb our way to peace. They can't fight our way to happiness. They can't burn down expecting to build us up. They can't scream until we smile. It just adds fire to the fire.

On the contrary, as MLK so profoundly proclaimed, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that." While we may feel helpless and hopeless, in reality we do have options right now beyond expecting career politicians to blast us a path forward. We have options. Namely, we can choose grace. We can choose peace. We can listen to Jesus who reminds us that light shines in the darkness, life conquers death, and love (for God and neighbor) is key.

The verse I keep coming back to over and over again these last few weeks is from St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians. He writes, "We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body." (2 Cor. 4:8-10 emphasis mine).

Anyone paying attention right now is undeniably feeling somewhat hard pressed, perplexed, persecuted, and struck down. Nevertheless, the life of Jesus may be revealed through us. So, keep the faith, St. John. breathe. be at peace. now is the time to be Christ's church.


Creative Ministry

COUNCIL UPDATE

The May Council meeting was held on the 17th at 7:00 PM. The meeting began with devotions and reflections on the recent tragedy in Buffalo. Pastor read the beatitudes and offered prayer. The previous month's minutes and meeting agenda were approved.

Pastor reported that he was attending an online preaching convocation this week. There were two memorials last month for relatives of members (William Sherman & James Spigiel). Both scheduled baptisms were canceled due to covid. Pastor reported that worship attendance was improving and things appear on track as we head into summer.

The committees offered the following reports:

Social Ministry – The donated items for Haven House have been delivered. They were very appreciative. A motion was made and approved to send \$700 to Haven House in addition to what was collected.

Fellowship – The men's ministry continues to meet on Saturday mornings. A 'brown bag' lunch will continue to be held on the 2nd Friday of the month for anyone who is looking for a place to gather and share in friendly conversation. A women's 'lunch bunch' met on May 18th.

Worship and Music – Beginning June 5th we will worship ONCE on Sundays at 9:30 AM.

Personnel – Our sexton, Brittany, had covid, but has returned to work.

Christian Education – Sunday School will wrap up on May 22nd with a fun day on the church playground. On Wednesdays at 7 PM the adult Bible study group will meet at the church to discuss devotions from Richard Rohr.

Youth – Youth Group will not be held over the summer, but other youth events will be provided.

Building and Grounds – Spending is out-pacing the budget due to boiler maintenance and various other projects (lights & floors). The Boy Scouts and ARC have both cleaned up the exterior of the church for which we are very grateful. Larry Schroeder has stepped up to help our volunteer mowing crew.

Stewardship – We will raise money for ELCA World Hunger on May 22nd. Cookies and milk will be provided to encourage generosity.

Finance – Through April revenue and expenditures are nearly balanced. Weekly income was lighter than anticipated in April.

In the business portion of the meeting Pastor reported that the Town of Amherst has informed the church that the Outdoor Ministry Center qualifies for a 'major site development.' A hearing will be held on August 18th with the planning board to approve the project. Lee Dryden stepped up to assist Pastor with various aspects of this part of the process.

Volunteers are needed for the Rummage Sale on June 4th.

The meeting wrapped up with further discussion regarding the shooting in Buffalo. St. John will participate in the Main Street Sidewalk Vigil on Saturday, May 21 at 2 PM. Members are encouraged to bring nonperishable food items in. Items will be donated to Feedmore. In addition, the council voted to send \$1,000 to Feedmore.

The council recommends the creation of a small ad hoc group to discuss security concerns and our ministry. Suggested members include law enforcement officers, ushers, and pastor.

The meeting concluded with the Lord's Prayer at 8:07PM.

WHEN WILL IT END? by Marcia Brown

I write this from Buffalo, only two days after a mass shooting in a grocery store took 10 lives, and the feelings are still very raw. The names and photos with bios are out now, making it all the more painful. These tragedies have always been somewhere else—Minnesota, Colorado, Texas—but this is right at home, and for the rest of our Synod, too close to home.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is saddened by the all-too-frequent occurrences of gun violence in the U.S. We mourn the loss of life. We grieve for the victims and their families, who often feel silenced. And we lament for those who have done violence to others and often feel removed from a community of faith. But what can we do besides be sad, grieved, and lamented?

The ELCA actively works to prevent gun violence, through Advocacy to state and federal law makers, and through its Racial Justice Ministries. It calls us to work toward the prevention of gun violence as people of God who strive for justice and peace in all the world. 
